The Society's Year

I must express my personal thanks to all the members of the committee, who have all been working members who turn up to meetings. They have made chairing the group very easy.

Another real achievement this year, due mainly to Margaret Miller and Alan Mulcahy, has been the new edition of the Directory, following the excellent format devised by Wendy Mondy. Newcomers and long established residents will find it an invaluable source of information. Inevitably it will be out of date as soon as it is printed, but please send all corrections to the editor of *Distinctly Winkleigh*. Alterations can at least be posted into the online version.

The new website will, we are assured, be fully operational within the next few weeks, though we must admit that we have been assured of that before. One of the problems with the new website is that the very fancy diary and events page will not allow us to produce a printed version from it. For months we continued to wait for this to be resolved, but I have finally given up and proceeded with the old version. It is nothing like so fancy, but at least it can be printed.

Our other failure has been the calendar for 2014. Family issues take us away at critical times, and computers will fail just when they are most needed. By the time we had solved our problems, we could not have got the calendar into the shops before mid-November ... by which time you would all have bought your calendars. The time has come that he needs some assistance and he hopes to pass on the baton before too long. So volunteers will be very welcome. But even if you cannot offer to help in the production, editing or distribution, then you can surely contribute to the material. You will notice this issue that DW publishes stories and puzzles as well as factual matter. We have also published some obituaries, and would like to encourage this idea. If you want to commemorate the life of someone in the village, a published obituary is certainly one way to do so.

And, please, can we have some more letters to the editor. Or do we all approve of everything that is done to us by 'them with power'?

Harvest seems a long way back now but this is the first opportunity I have had of thanking everyone who supported our Harvest Festival.

The auction raised nearly £200 which will be going to 'Made-Well' an organisation near Hatherleigh which supports young people with learning difficulties through growing fruit and vegetables, various crafts and keeping livestock. They have a nice café there too, so if you're passing pop in and see what they do. This year that choice of where the money went was made by children from our Sunday School and we hope to take them over to Made-Well to present the cheque.

If Harvest seems a long way back, then Christmas seems to be frighteningly close! Sunday School are already turning their attention to the Crib Service on Christmas Eve to which we hope you will all come — and this year we have a real donkey! This is always a good start to our Christmas celebrations as we recall the story of Jesus' birth which is, after all, what Christmas is really about. You don't have to be a child or to bring children to attend the Crib Service — all are welcome as indeed all were welcome at the manger on that first Christmas. God sent his Son not just for a few chosen people but for everyone one of us, shepherds and wise men and everyone in between, and that itself is worth celebrating. But if you can't make the Crib Service, or even if you do, there are other services and events which mark this festival.

Friday 13th at 2.00 p.m. Winkleigh School will be having their Christmas service in Church and on Saturday 21st at 7.30 p.m. there will be the traditional Christmas Concert (including Carols for you to sing) by the Winkleigh Singers.

Winkleigh Recycling

A big thank you to all those who continue to support this venture. Over the past two years, as a village, we have saved nearly four tonnes of plastics (mostly not taken in our green boxes) from going to landfill sites. The scheme is run entirely by five volunteers and to make our lives a little easier, we would be really grateful if you could remember the following:

- ❖ **Please make sure that all plastics are clean (including flower pots).**
- ❖ **If possible, please squash plastic bottles flat.**
- ❖ **Please insert caps back into the squashed bottles, if possible.**
- ❖ **Please stack together any containers of a similar shape/size.**

In our recent Parish Plan Questionnaire, there were many comments about our plastics recycling scheme. Generally, people felt satisfied with the collection. They valued the fact that we were trying to offer them the opportunity to get rid of their plastics, in a responsible, environmentally friendly manner. However, many also felt that the new monthly system was not convenient for them and preferred the old permanent cages. For a while that system did work well, but as time went on, a number of problems started to arise. There were only four of us trying to keep it going, which proved to be very difficult when any of us were away. The dumpy bags were extremely heavy to lift out, especially when wet and sadly on many occasions, inappropriate items had been left. We could not sustain this service and were pleased when Peninsula Waste Savers (North Tawton), agreed to collect from us on a monthly basis instead.

As a group, our ultimate aim is to persuade Torridge and South Molton to take a greater range of plastics in our green boxes and that is the goal, which we are now working towards.

On with the story...

Maybe you were wondering about the provenance/meaning of strange wailings and cries of "No, not that one, give me the other 'A'." gently drifting on the air of a balmy Devon summer evening? Well, I'm about to tell you all about it. Are you sitting comfortably? Good. I shall begin...

We return to that dark, stormy night of Jan 2013 when a little huddle of around 10 nervous, but musically inclined, individuals gathered together at the 'Coffee & Grog' shop, a secret Bondleigh barn location, not too far from Danny and Jane Semorad's farmhouse. Unfortunately I can't provide further details as I'm sworn to secrecy (You might possibly find more about these 'goings-on' courtesy of ex-NSA's Edward Snowden – but then, methinks, even they don't know quite everything).

Anyway, these musicians had gathered together after replying to a 'musicians wanted' ad – one placed in this very periodical. Full of fear and trepidation, virtually quaking in their boots, they soon fell under the masterly yet calming spell of the BBB's own impresario and kindly director of music – Richard Edwards. It was either that or they had, by then, consumed sufficient red wine not to be quite so worried about the order of notes that tumbled from their assortment of diverse and randomly tuned instruments. The thing is, the ethos is about enjoying oneself playing and learning together at our fortnightly Sunday evening practice sessions. (Current venue: Winkleigh Community Centre). Richard does a magnificent job creating a first class (floggings are rare) environment at which all can contribute and enjoy the experience of making music. OK, it's a bit ragged at times although I blame the woodwind section who, in turn, blame the strings but never-the-less it is a truly wonderful social opportunity for people to get together and enjoy creating music (term used loosely)

Clearly our musical director and driving force, Mr Richard Edwards, deserves recognition for steering our growing band of musicians through its first twelve

months of life. Indeed I'm thinking a night-hood would be in order. Possibly one of those tall floppy ones adorned with tinkering bells? However, this is still work in progress as I need to investigate the appropriate process in order to make this happen. In the meantime I remain open to HRH advice and suggestions...

Members & Meetings

The recent **Community Plan Questionnaire** highlighted a need for elected representatives to raise their profile within the community. Knowing about the **Council** and who your **Councillors** are, might help kick this off. Each quarter in **Distinctly Winkleigh** we hope to feature some aspect of your Council's work. So, you may or may not know ...

- Anyone living in Winkleigh or Hollocombe can run as a **Councillor** (some restrictions may apply), **elections are held every 4 years in May - the next is in 2015**. The **Chair, Vice Chair** and **Committee Reps** are elected by Council members every year at the **AGM**.
- Being a Councillor is an on-going commitment and carries some responsibility - you need time to be a Councillor! Council work is governed by regulations laid down under statute, to be conducted in an open, transparent and accountable way. Oh yes, and **Parish Councillors are UNPAID volunteers!**
- Our **Parish Clerk** (Nicki) is employed and paid by the Council to carry out the administrative workload; our **District Councillor** (David) acts as a point of liaison between the parish and Torridge District Council.
- **Parish Council Meetings** are open to the public and are held on the **4th Wednesday of every month** (except Aug & Dec), usually in the Community Centre or Village Hall in Winkleigh. **Members of the public** are welcome to attend and can speak on any subject they wish, during either of the two **PUBLIC PERIODS**.

Council meetings are a chance for you to come along and meet Councillors, listen in or have your say - so please do. **Agendas and Minutes** are posted in **Parish Notice Boards** (by Kings Arms in Winkleigh and in Hollocombe) or you can go on the **email circulation list** by contacting Nicki (see list). Check Notice Boards for additional or extraordinary meetings too.

A CHRISTMAS STORY

“Shall us go to Midnight Service tonight, Jack? ‘Ave ‘ee decided? I do so like to sing the carols and rejoice, with our friends, that ‘E came ‘ere to live among us.” Sue Glover looked at her husband enquiringly. Before they married he often accompanied her to church, but they’d been married three years now, and he’d never gone to church with her on Sunday. So I daresn’t leave Campion on ‘er own. ‘Er be openin’ up nicely, and losin’ a little fluid. No doubt about it. You go by yourself, or stay with me an’ Campion. Whichever you like.”

“I’d rather go with you, or be with you. I’ll come out with you, and ‘elp you calve the ‘eifer.”

So, as the church bells pealed their message across the frosty meadows, from the village, Sue Glover left the calving box to go back to the kitchen with the empty thermos. Jack had asked her to bring some mince pies with her, this time, when she’d refilled the flask. He’d visited Campion several times during the evening, but nothing much was happening. Refreshments would help to fill the waiting time. As Sue walked back across the yard, careful not to slip on the icy concrete, the bells had stopped, but she could hear Campion grinding her teeth, and helving in a troubled way. The heifer was standing up and kicking at her stomach, obviously uncomfortable.

“Things have changed since you went in,” Jack told her. “Put the food on the winder-sill, out of the way. I’ve managed to get a halter on her. I want you to hold her head while I put my hand in, to feel what’s happening. We might have to get Andrew out, Christmas Eve or not. I don’t like her making these noises instead of getting on with it.”

Hi Everyone, Seasons Greetings. Where has this year gone! it doesn't seem five minutes ago we were talking about Christmas parties.



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Affordable and Later-life housing

What is 'affordable housing'? Housing where the cost is realistically manageable in relation to local wages. Usually the rent can be low because the scheme is not for profit and the initial build/development cost is kept low by a significant amount of voluntary effort. It includes self-build schemes and part-equity schemes, which enable first-time buyers to get a foothold in the property market. Several charitable organizations support local volunteers to form their own Community Land Trusts.

For two years plus, a small group of us have been looking into the potential in Winkleigh for developing some community-owned affordable housing. It is widely recognised that the 'affordable housing' produced by commercial developers is not keeping up with demand, and is unsatisfactory in other ways. One great advantage of community-developed buildings is that local people (with a residence qualification) can be given priority. During this period, I attended three Community Land Trust development events to learn about and visit schemes already under construction or completed in Devon and Cornwall, the nearest being the one led by David Brown at High Bickington.

Our initial work has been carried out with the organizational support of Winkleigh Community Assets Trust, who have held the grant money on our behalf. (Technically, the Community Asset Trust could already act as a Community Land Trust, but would need additional legal arrangements to allow it to develop a scheme involving some market housing, for example.)

A year ago, an opportunity arose to purchase the land vacated by the former pre-school (beside the Community Centre in Castle Street) from the County Council. We made an initial indication of interest. With help from the Community Land Trust organization, we developed a business scheme for the site and looked at the legal forms for establishing a Community Land Trust. Because the potential scheme was a not-for-profit one, we obtained generous advice without charge from architects and builders; and one of these prepared several schemes for developing the site. We made preliminary enquiries with the planning authority. We applied to the Community Land Trust organization for a technical grant of £3,500 to pay for further preliminary professional services and we received a further grant of £1000 from our County Councillor, Andy Boyd. We believed that this particular site with close proximity to the village and services, was especially suited to later life housing. The requirement for affordable housing purpose-built for easy access and assisted living is likely to grow rapidly. Winkleigh already has a higher than the national average number of people in this age range.

However at the time that we were first required to make a formal offer to the County Council, the housing market in general was still very uncertain, making

the raising of the money for the initial purchase quite difficult. We made what we knew was a fairly low offer, not really knowing how long it would take to raise the necessary funds. (This can be done in various ways, in some cases by inviting members of the community to take shares in a Community Land Trust or charitable company. Such schemes often establish the support in the community and build up funds before land is identified – but this was not our situation!). In the event, the County decided to take offers from the commercial market. Initially these were very slow in coming but as confidence built up, they received offers, which were significantly higher than ours. Sadly the community benefit seems not to have carried much weight. The present position is that a commercial developer's offer has been accepted, although as yet, 5 months on, contracts have not yet been exchanged.

Undeterred, in the near future, we hope to arrange a public meeting for all those interested in this community project.

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ACE Archaeology Club

At the same time as I write this article for Distinctly Winkleigh, the ACE committee are preparing for our AGM. This year I am looking forward to writing the Chairman's report because there are so many positive things to write about. As well as our usual meetings on the first Saturday of every month, over the summer we have held three major events; the Festival of Old Technology and Archaeology, an Excavation at Moistown and a Conference, which is no mean feat for a small club.

As I reported in the last issue of Distinctly Winkleigh, the Festival of Old Technology and Archaeology in July was a great success, despite clashing with Winkleigh Fair. I have been asked by a reader of DW to change the date of our festival, should it coincide again, I am afraid that this is not possible as the middle weekend of the Council for British Archaeology's, National Festival of Archaeology, is the only time that the Kernow Levy can manage, as they are appearing elsewhere in the country on the other two weekends. Unfortunately the date of the festival next year does coincide with Winkleigh fair again, so to get round this we are extending the festival to two days; Saturday 19th and Sunday 20th July, so that you will be able to attend both the fair and the festival. What a fun packed weekend that will be!

The excavation at Moistown started on the 7th September and so did the rain! We only lost about two days in total to the weather during our fortnight but it did slow us down and consequently we did not get quite as far as we had hoped to. Although we did uncover some beautiful cobbles at one end of the trench, we did not get down deep enough in the area where the dowsers thought a wall to be. The trench is now back filled so finding out if the dowsers were right, will have to wait until next year when we uncover it all again. It was a great fortnight though and really nice to start seeing the real Moistown. We will be sorting the finds and carrying out other post excavation work over the winter months.

Only three weeks after the dig had finished we held our first Conference; 'Life in the Past: Archaeology, Rural Practices and Skills', at the Boniface Centre, in Crediton. There were nine speakers in all, covering quite diverse subjects, including Ancient textiles, Mediaeval ploughing, the Devon Domesday, Farriery past and present, Post war farming on Dartmoor, Dowsing, Hedging and the work of the Rural Skills Trust. The day was well attended, there was a buzz of chatter as people "networked" between presentations, as they perused the exhibitions and specialist book stalls. We were all very pleased with the day and there is talk of organising another conference in the future.

I hope that you can see now why I am looking forward to writing the Chairman's report!

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District Councillor's Report

On Saturday November 2nd, the second consultation day event took place regarding the emerging Winkleigh Parish Plan. Over 80 people came along to give their views on what had emerged from the Winkleigh questionnaire. The results from the questionnaire itself reaffirmed to me why we originally came to live here, as the majority of responses showed a good balance of views. Most understood the special features of living in a rural community as well as the drawbacks, such as limited transportation and access to services. Yet at the same time the majority also recognised the need for some small-scale development – particularly if it involved more affordable housing for local people – and the importance of enhancing our environment.

At the consultation event many asked about what changes might happen as a result of the Parish Plan, and how would the plan fit within the Local Plan for northern Devon, which will hopefully be signed off next year. It is always difficult to know whether government is listening. At the moment the government is betting heavily on changes in the housing to lead the recovery. As readers of my last report in **Distinctly Winkleigh** will know, I am rather concerned about all the ramifications of the Help to Buy scheme that is the main flagship for the government. While it is definitely stimulating demand, the supply side at best can only grow by about 15 to 20% (with a fair wind) over the next three years. While it will boost house prices, it will make it harder for many potential first-time buyers – who are not getting ‘real’ wage increases – to get a home and it is likely to squeeze out many affordable housing schemes.

Here in Winkleigh we were being asked to plan for a relatively modest growth in housing – around 54 new homes over the next 18 years. (Of course there is no certainty that any might be delivered, as developers will endeavour to go to most popular areas first, and high fuel prices have definitely put off some families and retired people from moving to rural locations). However, following the APM and questionnaire responses, the PC accepted an allocation of around 27 new homes as part of Winkleigh's submission to TDC's Local Plan, so long as the majority of homes are affordable for local people; use local building materials and add to rural distinctiveness; are energy efficient; and are in small-scale developments and not in a big estate.

Employment opportunities are also high on the priorities in Winkleigh's Parish Plan (and the Local Plan for northern Devon). In around Winkleigh we are fortunate to have a number of micro and small to medium businesses doing a wide variety of activities. The trick over the next few years will be for many businesses to move “up the value ladder” (and faster broadband will help) and to attract inward investment, as our wonderful environment should encourage people that want to develop their own businesses to move into the area.

But the Parish Plan is more than just housing and employment. A number of relatively inexpensive ‘quick win’ initiatives have been identified and are being evaluated, and a number of Winkleigh residents have volunteered their expertise to help make things happen. Now more than ever Winkleigh needs volunteers to help shape the things that matter in our community and I am hopeful that new initiatives coming from Parish Plan will play their part in enriching the lives of people in our community.
